

The weather has warmed, flowers are in bloom and the flying field has been mowed for the first time this season. I'm not sure what may be the cause of this unseasonably warm weather but some believe it is the result of global warming, caused by heat build-up in the new version of the I-Pad.

Regardless of the reason, there have already been numerous practice flights of various flying-wing configurations, in anticipation of all-out WAR. A launch stand has been built from 1/2" PVC pipe and proven effective at consistently launching combat wings at a 45-degree angle. It's a simple procedure to place a wing on the stand and apply full power. Planes depart the contraption faster than age spots appear in a retirement community. The pilot in command can keep both hands on the controls for any immediate corrections that may be required. Combat missions will commence the last Sunday of each month, commencing on April 29th at noon. The plan is to fly each 4-minute round of combat immediately after each complete round of Four-Star racing has concluded. This will provide ample time for competitors to charge batteries and make necessary adjustments or repairs. Put some kind of electric motor on some kind of flying contraption and become an "artful-dodger" of other strange flying objects.

The 58th annual Weak Signals "Toledo RC Show"

If you have not attended the Toledo RC Show or have not been lately you are missing a lot of RC fun, education and bargains. This years event begins April 13 and runs through Sunday, April 15, 2012. The exhibit area hours are 9 AM - 5 PM on Friday and Saturday and 9 AM - 2 PM on Sunday. Ten dollars gets you in the door and those 12 and under are free. But don't wait for the exhibits to open because the swap area opens early in the morning and you get the first look at these gems by getting there about 6:30 AM. If you have items to sell a table is only \$25 for Friday and Saturday.

More about the exhibitors shortly, but there is more RC fun than just vendors and swap shopping. There is the ETOC Indoor World Championship where the best pilots from around the world compete in both pattern and freestyle routines at the Central Catholic High School, just a few miles from SeaGate Center, site of the exhibit hall. Geront Bruckman is the defending champion having won in 2011 and 2010. Seth Arnold won in 2009 and will be competing along with Christoph Lausberg from Germany. You can watch the best pilots in the world up close in this exciting venue on Friday and Saturday evening. New this year will be the BLADE Micro Invitational Challenge, so we will see some of the best helicopter pilots fly too.

If you want to fly while in Toledo there is the Bash for Cash Combat event. Each heat will have 15 airplanes, the winners of each heat will compete for cash. Airplanes of 10 ounces or less and batteries of 800 mAh are the limits for participation on Friday night. This event is also at Central Catholic High School.

Another competition is in the static display area of the Exhibit Hall at SeaGate Center where classes of aircraft are judged, everything from jets, helicopters, sport planes, RC Old Timers to designer scale planes compete within their class and for the coveted "Best of Show." and it's not just limited to things that fly. There are cars, trucks boats and more. Another often overlooked opportunity are the symposiums held on Friday and Saturday. There are about 18 classes each day with topics from building scale to better soldering technique. Mike McConville will be holding one on Horizon's new AS3X technology and another program will explain ignition timing and engine tuning. These programs are free with your admission.

AeroWorks will be there and a number of our members are flying their models as is the case with Extreme Flight, great airplanes and great service from nice people. For those looking for a fiberglass cowl for a Stinson check out Fiberglass Specialties, Inc, they have what you need and want and you won't have to glue 18 bumps on your cowl. If you have seen plans you liked but want to have someone else laser cut the wood, visit Precision Cut Kits, they have a great selection of laser cut kits at good prices. Vogelsang Aeroscale will be there with some of the great kits they import from Europe. And XOAR Props will have a great selection of their propellers.

Please remember, use the flight stations just like you would for engine powered airplanes. Another observation has been when the wind is out of the north, we tend to fly closer to the shelter resulted in several "Klondikes " which we have not been enforced this spring. Remember, if the wind is out of the north, fly more to the north to compensate for the wind blowing your plane toward the shelter.

Then there is the member who guided his Four-star to a perfect landing. After accepting the accolades from other members for such a good landing, he set his transmitter on the ground and walked out on the field to his still running airplane. Remember, never set your transmitter down while the engine is still running.

We depend on each other for safety. It's OK to remind each other about safety issues. Be Safe, and I'll be watching from the lawn chairs.
