E-Fest 2014 was held February 15 and 16, 2014 in Champaign, Illinois at the University of Illinois Track and Field Armory. I headed to Champaign early Friday afternoon in a blizzard a trip that took over 3 hours not the usual hour and a half. Passing through Bloomington, the West bound traffic on I 74 was stopped the result of numerous accidents. It was hard not to contemplate turning around and heading home. But the thought of missing the best indoor event in the area kept me motivated to push on. Arriving after 3 PM the Armory was all set up and we could secure a table and bring in our airplanes, helicopters, quad-copters and support equipment. I claimed three tables by spreading my stuff across far more space than was needed for three airplanes and a helicopter. But I knew others from PRCM would be heading to E-FEST and they would need room to set up.

Friday was a time for unrestricted flying, as many pilots as wanted to fly could fly until late in the evening. Unless you have flown in the Armory with its 100 foot ceiling (our sports complex ceiling is about 35 feet high) it is hard to appreciate all the room there is to explore. After a fun day of flying I left everything at the Armory and headed to the hotel.

Saturday morning I was second in line at 7 AM to get in the Armory. I was pre-registered but unlike some years you could not sign in on Friday. Pre-registration saved you \$5 on

registration fee and earned you a goody bag with a servo, CA glue, accelerator and other goodies. The bag was worth more than the \$20 price of admission. By arriving early on Saturday you can park right across the street from the Armory entrance and it makes loading the car a simple task when you are ready to head home.

Peoria RC Modelers was represented by more than 14 club members on Saturday. While many came to shop and watch the flying, at least three (perhaps others) of us, Michael Fenelon, Mark Kiefer and I also came to fly. If you are thinking about flying next year I encourage you to talk to Michael and Mark, they both had big smiles and really enjoyed the Armory.

The day has lots of open flying sometimes restricted to fast airplanes and jets and at other times only small and light airplanes get to fly. But most of the day it is fly what you want and this year there was no limit on the number of aircraft flying!

E-FEST has a number of contests from combat (Tom and Joe were finalists last year but did not compete this year) to night flying to scale competition. There is also the Red Bull racing and this year to insure there was more carnage they had balloon busting. You had the chance to win a \$40 quad-copter by popping a balloon with your airplane. Did I mention there were as many as 6 balloons tied to the floor with string in close proximity to each other and that it looked similar to combat? The crowd loved it.

E-FEST has a number of vendors selling all things RC and our club members made a number of purchases. Hopefully we will see some of these new purchases on Friday nights at our indoor flying.
