"Whiskey Seven", A World War II C 47 with a big W7 painted on its nose has made several trips to the EAA fly-in at Oshkosh. Even thou that is a very important trip, it's most famous trip had to be across the English Channel on the night of June 5th 1944. That night she dropped paratroopers from the 82nd Airborne Division into Normandy France. She also made the return trip this last June for the 70th anniversary of D-Day. Once again she filled the skies over Normandy with paratroopers for the re-enactment.

Last year while I was working at Oshkosh Tower I met a fellow Air Traffic controller who also flies RC. When he is not working at the Oshkosh Tower he works full time at Evansville Tower. Last year we began talking about RC, he told me about a "little project" he was working on, so of course this year I wanted an update. He told me a little bit about the details of his build and as we talked I learned a lot more. He told me he was planning on painting his project like Whiskey Seven. I couldn't believe he was going to paint such a nice looking airplane with such an ugly paint job. I told him it is ALL WRONG, and that is exactly why he liked it so much. The full size C47 has a 1/2 brown and 1/2 green fuselage with a brown tail and a green nose and rudder, red prop nuts and an off gray belly. Part of the plane is semi gloss while other parts are flat. Nothing matches, it is just a big hodgepodge of colors.

As we talked more, I found out he had purchased a detailed flight deck from Dynamic Balsa in Leonore.

- 2 RED tru-turn prop nuts
- 2 2300 mah A123 batteries from TaildraggerRC
- 4 days of epoxy riveting with his wife's help
- 4 days of panel lines, 1/64" taped, primed then removed
- Smartfly EQ10 power distribution
- 43 pounds with 4.4 pounds in the nose for balance
- 669 days from first glue to 1st flight
- Several hundred dollars on dinners and a new set of patio furniture to keep his wife happy! - Priceless!










The International Miniature Aircraft Association (IMAA), the largest special interest group of the Academy of Model Aeronautics, is shutting down at the end of 2014. Members received an E-mail in August about the closure.

The group's purpose was to promote quarter scale and larger model airplanes to modelers world-wide. The IMAA published "High Flight" Magazine which was a high quality publication supported by many national advertisers. The last publication of the magazine will be the fall 2014 addition.

I talked to Tom Griffith, IMAA's Regional Director, at Champaign last mouth, and found out the IMAA decided to offer an "on line" addition of "High Flight". Start up cost were higher then expected and many members did not want to give up the paper magazine. Tom also said membership in IMAA had been going down while cost to run the organization increased.

Tom felt a new group will emerge to represent the interests of large scale airplanes.

As you look through your copy of "Model Aviation" you will see just how important special interest groups are to the AMA. There are always articles from special interest groups such as Control line Aerobatics, RC Jets, Free Flight, or Pattern. I'm sure we will be seeing "Big Birds" back soon.

STREAMERS OVER MOSSVILLE

If ever there was a perfect day for combat activities, it was Saturday 9/27. Glen Howard, Jim Fassino, Elijah Melloy, Verne Holeman, Roger Wheeler and Roger Stegall launched into a beautiful sky in anticipation of mega ribbon cutting. When the first minute of the 4 minutes had expired, three of the 6 starting planes crashed within 4 feet of each other as if some unexplained vortex of doom (also known as bad piloting skills) managed to suck them out of the sky. During the 3rd minute of the contest, Jim Fassino's plane executed a body slam on Roger Wheeler's unsuspecting combat entry, swatting it out of the sky. Jim's plane then became uncontrollable and came to rest in the same pile as the original 3 downed craft. Glen Howard was the sole survivor of the heat and got one point for outlasting the carnage. Heat #2 was short 2 flyers as Elijah and Roger Wheeler attempted to make repairs. Early in the round, Jim Fassino and Verne surcummed to the forces of gravity leaving Stegall and Howard chasing each other about the sky for the remainder of the task. Holeman, Howard and Stegall were the only pilots to start heat #3. Vern's foam wing went MIA during the first minute, again leaving Stegall's red ribbon chasing Glen Howard's yellow tail. When all the foam dust had settled, Glen Howard won the day with 3 points, followed by Roger Stegall with 2 points while everybody else had a score of Zero and a serious




Raptor pilots R. Stegall, J. Fassino, J. Hoelscher and Glen Howard squared off in the 1st heat against the home built wing of Elijah Melloy and the P51 EPO foamy of Tom Imhoff. The final seconds of the 10-second count down had all six pilots diving toward the start line at the center of the field. Hoelscher got a good jump on the crowd and took the lead into the first turn. Stegall was asleep at the switch and started at the back of the pack. By the end of the 2nd lap Hoelscher, Stegall and Imhoff were in a tight group followed by another tight group of the remaining 3 pilots. The race ended with Hoelscher first across the finish line followed by Stegall, Imhoff, Fassino, Howard and Melloy. After the cut judges were consulted, Hoelscher had cut twice, Stegall had 2 cuts, Imhoff set a new record with 8 cuts, Fassino amassed 2 cuts, Melloy had 2 cuts leaving Glen Howard 20 first place points as the only pilot who did not cut a Everybody but Howard needed to recalibrate their turns for heat #2. The 10-second countdown for the 2nd race ended with all planes tightly grouped going into the 1st turn. It sounded like a swarm of angry wasps as the 4 raptors zoomed down the straight-away. Everybody was competitive all the way to the





Stegall finished first followed by Hoelscher, Fassino, Imhoff and Howard. Turn judges recorded one cut for both Stegall and Hoelscher, leaving Fassino in 1st place, followed by Imhoff & Howard. Heat #3 had a sky-full of 6 planes, all tightly grouped for the entire race. For the first time, not a single pilot took a short cut to a pylon. Hoelscher led the race for 5.5 laps but Stegall edged his Raptor at the last turn and eeked out a narrow victory by the hair of his chinny-chin-chin.



Following Hoelscher were Imhoff, Howard and Fassino. Elijah's home built went down in the corn prior to his finish of the 6th lap. Glen Howard took top honors for the day with 40 points, followed by Fassino with 30, Stegall had 20, Hoelscher and Imhoff tied with 15 points each. Elijah Melloy didn't score any points but made a gallant effort in his 1st attempt at unlimited electric racing. A note of "Thanks" goes out to all who participated in this fast-paced racing event.




Dear: Full Hand
