

Outdoor flying season is just around the corner. Many of us are likely preparing for the upcoming season by building new projects or carefully going over projects in our hangars. Here are just a couple of reminders as you prepare for the upcoming outdoor season.

# **Shop Safety:**

As you build or inspect please establish some safety procedures to protect both you and your models. Establish procedures for storing knives, adhesives, and electrical devices (soldering irons, heat guns, etc.). "Everything in its place and a place for everything" is an adage we have all heard but may not adhere to. Knowing where your hobby knife is at all times, for example, can prevent an unfortunate accident from injuring you or your plane, helicopter or quad. Please remember to never leave electronic equipment plugged in and turned on when you are not in your shop. We have an active club with many opportunities to fly, and we want everyone to take full advantage of those opportunities unimpeded by injury.



# At the Field:

When you arrive at the field, please take the time to sign-in to the flight log. There will be an updated log this season that will ask members to include additional information we can use in future decision making. Additionally, this information should be helpful to the Peoria Park District to substantiate our compliance with guidelines and procedures.

Take your time to unload and assemble your equipment. There are many times when an unfortunate accident has been attributed to rushing to assemble planes and forgetting to tighten a wing bolt or check a prop nut.

Before you fly, establish a pre-flight procedure to check that control surfaces are functioning properly and in the right direction. I have learned the hard way on more than one occasion that it is easy to have ailerons or elevators reversed with disastrous results. There are few more sickening feelings than dorking a plane into the ground after take-off because or reversed ailerons; especially on a maiden flight.

Remember to follow safe procedures for charging batteries, starting glow or gas engines, or running up engines before flight. For planes, be sure to use the flight stands, tie-downs or other restraints when starting and running up an engine or motor. Don't hesitate to ask a fellow club member for a hand to safely hold an airplane during start-up or run-up. I have never seen someone in our club decline to provide assistance when it comes to safety.

Finally, we sometimes forget that others may not be aware of our actions while flying. Please announce "Taking Off" or "Landing" loud enough for other pilots to hear before Initiating these procedures. Additionally, if you need to retrieve your model from the field, clearly announce "On The Field" before attempting to remove your model, and follow up with "Field Clear" when the model has been safely

retrieved. I also hope to see everyone at The final four (4) Friday night indoor events, and looking forward to a safe and



# Out of the Bone Yard And into the Air, *Again*

The Strategic Arms Reduction treaty, limits the number of B52s the United States can have to only 76 strong. Last year, while sitting on the ground at Barksdale AFB, (Louisiana) an oxygen leak and a spark ended the usable life of one of our B52s. After an intense cockpit fire it was deemed cheaper to pull another B52 out of the bone yard than to repair the damage caused by the fire. For the first time in the history of the Air Force, a B52 was ordered out of the bone yard to return to active duty.

This is no easy or cheap task. After 70 days of work, "Ghost Rider" was in decent enough shape to fly once again. She flew to Barksdale AFB from Arizona below 250 knots and 23,000 feet with her gear down the entire flight. She also had no GPS or current navigational equipment on board which made the flight a little more challenging. After landing, she was parked next to her burnt out sister, where they will swap out the majority of her major onboard components. By this October she will be ready to fly to Tinker AFB, (Oklahoma) where she will undergo a major overhaul.

In early 2016, *Ghost Rider* will return to the active duty fleet as one of the youngest B52H models. She will have only 17,000 hours on her airframe where most of the others are well over 18,000 hours and growing daily. For a cost of around 13 million dollars, the 54 year old *Ghost Rider* will be reborn out of the bone yard to serve again on active duty. I am glad to see the system works as intended. For once it seems Uncle Sam has got something right.









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# **Model Airplanes Banned at**

# Detweiller

After 40 years at Detweiller Park, the nation's oldest radio-controlled model airplane club is being given a new site in Radnor Township due to the Peoria Park District's concerns for safety and liability.

Peoria Park Board members voted Wednesday to have an ordinance drawn banning the use of such aircraft in Detweiller Park, and also authorized a license agreement giving the RC Modelers Club exclusive use of the new site.

Until the board acts on those items, and until it obtains clarification on the club's liability insurance, flying at Detweiller is banned.

Members of the RC Modelers who attended the meeting say their insurance through the Academy of Model Aeronautics does cover accidents arising from the operation of models in accordance with the official AMA safety code.

And they said the fact that Detweiller does not meet the dimensions of the "model" field does not invali-

bers must adhere strictly to the AMA safety code or lose their license.

The incident to which Noble referred, he said, "was not a club member." Trustees agree that part of the problem is that the popular activity has drawn fliers who do not belong to the club.

Insurance coverage provided by the club through the AMA has a \$500,000 limit per occurrence for bodily injury, but that coverage does not extend to non-members.

While Allen and others didn't object to moving to the new site in Leslie Rutherford Park on Dickison Cemetery Road, they said there is "no way" it can be ready this summer, and asked the Park Board permit them to use Detweiller Park until the new site is prepared.

That site being offered by the park district is presently farmland which must be cleared and seeded this spring and again in the fall.

Cost to the park district for the site improvements is estimated at \$4,144 and RC Modelers say they also will need to invest around \$5,000.

Trustees voted to go ahead with

date the coverage.

But park district Controller Jan Budzynski said when she questioned an AMA spokesman as to whether the flying area should encompass any roadways or buildings, he said they should not "and should definitely not encroach upon major thoroughfares."

Because the Detweiller Park flying area adjoins Galena Road, there is concern the model planes may create distractions for drivers and cause accidents on the road. There are also a large number of park users in the area.

Park Board President Bonnie Noble said she was a passenger in a car when it was "buzzed" by a plane, "and some planes have crashed out there.

"Knowing what we know has happened in the past, I don't see how we can in good conscience continue to let Detweiller be used," she said. "So far we have just been extremely lucky."

RC Modelers President Jim Allen Sr. disputed that, saying "safety is our No. 1 priority" and club mem-

work this spring to prepare the new flying site, but at the same time said they will also seek clarification of insurance coverage at Detweiller.

The board also heard a report from James Elson of Elson & Associates landscape architects on irrigation plans for Newman Golf Course which call for drilling a second well on the site to supply an additional 100 gallons a minute.

Elson said the first well drilled in 1984 cost \$12,000 and it is hoped the second can be drilled for \$16,000 to \$18,000. He estimated use of the two wells will save the district \$1,800 a month in water bills.

Contractors will be able to bid on either a Rainbird or Toro system, or both, Elson said, and alternates on a computer system and a weather station will be among the options for bidding. Rip-rapping the lake will also be a part of the contract.

Bid packages are expected to go out to irrigation, plumbing and electrical contractors this month. The schedule calls for bidding from March 15 to March 29.
