



Club Meeting Highlights










Eissler. He is a member of 'Sub-Committee'. Germany had 4 major sub types all named by a Type number. He is shown with a Type 23's innards. Blood pressure cuffs are used for bladders to allow for static raise/lower. Diving planes are used for dynamic raise/lower. A Type 21, which came out at war's very tail end, is in the foreground. Finishing hint: Walmart's cheap black primer works well. (Left) A Type 7, 1/40 scale, was the earliest WWII sub. It runs 45 minutes on NiCd's and brushed motors. Some models are 600 sized RC aircraft direct drive motors, and some are geared RC car motors.

(Above two) A type 23 outside and its' detailing. Weld lines are simulated by scratching a groove, then running CA down the seam.

We all enjoyed the presentation, models, and the video with underwater shots of various subs shooting torpedoes.



(Above) Jim Fassino couldn't wait for Mrs. Claus, and impulsively picked up this cute looking <u>Tiny</u> <u>Tiger Moth</u> made by Green Model. It came complete except for battery and radio, as I recall. Let's hope the air is calm on our Numb Thumb's fly on Jan 1, and see the maiden flight (IF Jim can wait that long).

(Below) Roger Stegall showed his Great Plane's Giles 202. It has one of his 8 45cc gas motors (I think he's saving the rest for a BIG multi-engine project next year). A wood 20 x 10 prop will pull the 14 lb through the air. It has a 76" span. It took only 20 hours to build so he now has time to help the wife stir chocolate chip cookies. It is 6 channels with dual elevator servos, and an engine cut off servo (nice safety device with gas power). All fitting are heavy duty and mount from only one side making for a clean look. It also had a shock isolated tailwheel. I wonder if he'll do the maiden flight on ski's???

Painting Foam Models

From the "Robbins Nest" by Dennis Robbins Hi-Sky R/C Flyer, Midland, Texas Taken from AMA Insider magazine, Nov 2006.

Many people are building with foam these days, and Blucore fanfold and Depron seem to be the material of choice. One drawback to scratch building with foam is the color choices. You get to choose from either blue (Blucore) or white or gray (Depron).

Most of us like a more visible color scheme, and painting is the only way to obtain the desired look. I paint most of my aircraft, and I'd like to share my simple techniques for painting foam.

The first step is to make a paper template of the design you want. I then place this on the airplane in the desired location, and mark the corners of the template. I use some type of colored permanent marker which hopefully matches the paint color being used, and connect the dots, more or less. This gives me a border, and paint can be applied between the lines.

The paint I use is the cheap, acrylic, water-based paint found at your local craft store. These come in small plastic bottles and only cost roughly \$.75 to \$1.00. You will be amazed at the color selection.

All you need to get started is a small container to squeeze a small amount of paint into, and several sizes of inexpensive paint brushes. I also keep some craft sticks on hand for stirring the paint if needed.

To thin the paint, add water and stir away! The last thing you need to know is be patient! Let the paint dry completely and you will be rewarded with a model everyone will be envious of.

Since many are building in the winter, and more of us do foam, here's a timely and appropriate article for the club.
